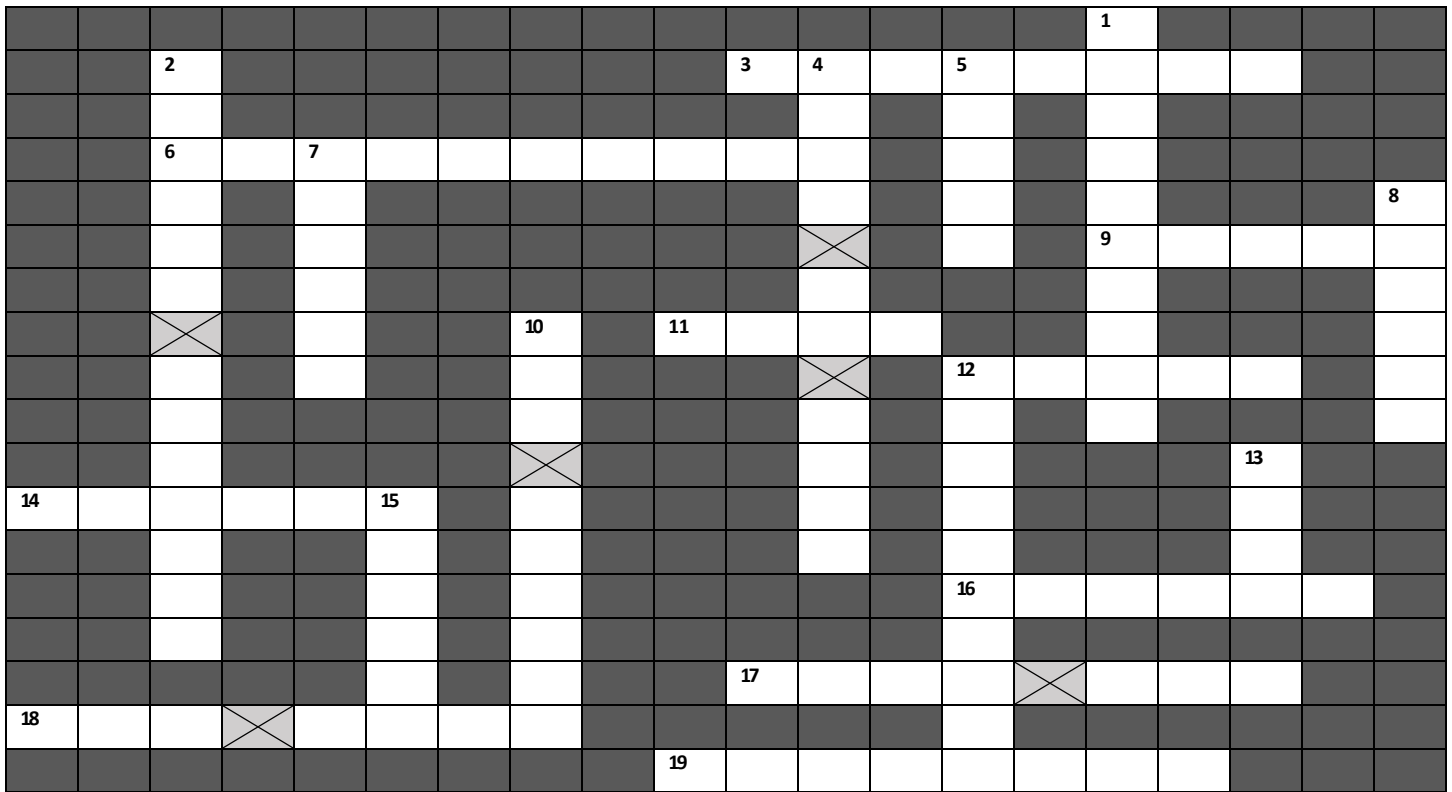


EXHIBIT HALL CROSSWORD
